Description:

US History 1 & 2 comprises a year-long study of our country. First semester we begin with an in-depth review of the Constitution of the United States and will continue through to American Imperialism. Second semester we begin with World War I and continue to Modern American History. Special emphasis will be placed on the social, economic, and political forces that have shaped the American character.

Objectives:

US History 1 & 2 are required graduation courses designed to help the student develop and an understanding of the United States and its people. Students will be graded on assignments, quizzes and test each semester. A semester project may also be assigned during the semester. There will be lectures, videos, document research, and discussion sessions to supplement the textbook when appropriate. Classroom discussions will be initiated by the teacher on selected topics with tolerance for opinions stressed. Students will be required to listen, use facts, theory and logic when discussing an issue and defending an opinion. Furthermore, students will be encouraged to understand all sides of an issue and think analytically while respecting one another during the learning process.

Materials:

The courses will use the textbook "United States History" by Lapsansky-Werner, Levy, Roberts and Taylor 2010. Additional reading and materials will be used throughout the year.
